Todd Simon MD received his B.A. from Amherst College (1987), and his MD degree from New York University Medical Center (1991). In October 2003 Dr. Simon joined Jersey City Medical Center as Vice Chairman of Medicine and Residency Program Director. After three productive and educational years there, he returned to New York City in October 2006 as Vice Chairman and Associate Program Director in the Department of Medicine of New York Methodist Hospital in Brooklyn. He also directed the 4<sup>th</sup> year medical student Sub-Internship in Medicine there until 2015. In July, 2015, Dr. Simon became the Chief Academic Officer and Designated Institutional Official of the hospital. In that position, he maintains oversight of 15 ACGME accredited programs, approximately 300 residents and fellows, and all medical student rotations. In December, 2016 New York Methodist Hospital became part of the New York Presbyterian Regional Hospital Network, and changed its name to NewYork-Presbyterian Brooklyn Methodist Hospital. On April 1, 2018, Dr. Simon took over as the Internal Medicine Residency Program Director.

Dr. Simon has been active in APDIM (Past-President of the New York Special Interest Group), and ACP (current Councilor for Brooklyn, Queens, & Staten Island, former Brooklyn District President, and former Chair of the national ACP Post-Graduate/Chapter Education Committee). He was the recipient of the New York ACP Laureate Award in June, 2018. He is a general Internist who divides his time between administrative activities, teaching residents and medical students, and patient care.
