

VIRTUAL LECTURE: WOMEN IN MEDICINE PAST PRESENT AND FUTURE

Alan S. Weber Professor of English

Before the 1960s, women represented only a small percentage of the licensed physicians in the world. However, due to dramatic changes in the past 50 years, women medical residents now outnumber men in a number of U.S. residency specialties, such as Immunology and Genetics. Internationally, women make up over 70% of the Global Healthcare Workforce.

How did we get here?

Dr. Weber has been studying this striking sociological phenomenon for over 20 years through his courses on women in medicine at WCMQ and Cornell-Ithaca, including a MOOC for Cornell's CyberTower. His ground-breaking articles and scholarly edition of Sarah Jinner and Mary Holden (2003) were the first discoveries of previously unknown women medical writers in Britain. He has also published with Nada Darwish on "Muslim Women Healers" (2016).
