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## MORE DOCTORS IN TRAINING AT WCMC-Q

WCMC-Q's Class of 2009 stepped across the threshold of their future profession as they donned their new white coats at a prestigious ceremony at the Medical College last night. The eighteen students in the Class were assisted in putting on their coats by WCMC-Q faculty including physicians from Hamad Medical Corporation, with other members of the WCMC-Q community, family and friends looking on.

Dean of WCMC-Q, Daniel R. Alonso, M.D. opened the evening by extending greetings to the assembly and congratulating the students on their achievement in joining the four-year medical program after completing the two-year pre-medical curriculum. He also reminded them that, even at this early stage of their medical education, expectations were high.

In her keynote speech to the gathering, Senior Associate Dean for Education, Elizabeth Alger, M.D., F.A.C.P., explained the significance of the white coat, as she examined both the privileges and the responsibilities of the physician today. Following this, Dr. Alonso read out the Hippocratic Oath to the assembly. This is a hallowed ritual in medical education, although the students will only come to repeat the Oath at their graduation ceremony some four years down the line.

The version read out at last night's ceremony was a revised form of an Oath that has its origins in ancient times. It was amended following consultations this year among leaders, faculty and students of Weill Cornell Medical College in the U.S. and Qatar. WCMC-Q participants in this process were Dr Alger, assistant professor in the division of medical ethics, Pablo Rodriguez del Pozo, M.D., Ph.D., J.D., and Khaled Al Khelaifi from the Class of 2008. In its new form, the Oath reflects contemporary concerns, such as the importance of social justice in medicine.

The students then filed down to the front of the lecture hall carrying their new, white coats, with the distinctive WCMC-Q patch on the left sleeve. They handed the coats to members of the medical faculty, who assisted the students in putting them on. This touching gesture symbolized the entry of the young men and women into the medical profession, guided by their seniors. The white coats are shorter in length than the coats normally worn by physicians, a recognition that, at this early stage of their medical education, they are still doctors-in-training.







Dr Alonso, said: "The ceremony is a renowned event in the profession that symbolizes the first steps of students into the world of medicine. The Class of 2009 is our second medical class bringing total numbers in the medical part of our M.D program to 34 out of a total student population across our four pre-medical and medical classes of 132. These are exciting times in the life of our institution with the growth in our student intake overall a sign that we are firmly on the radar of aspiring medical students across the region."

Among the Class of 2009 are sixteen students who completed the Pre-medical Program at WCMC-Q and two students who are graduates of the American University of Cairo.
