# Healing hands: being a doctor in Qatar

As part of efforts to engage young people in Qatar's medical and healthcare journey, Weill Cornell Medical College in Qatar (WCMC-Q) has announced its 1<sup>st</sup> Annual High School Essay Contest.

The contest will allow pupils to share their perspectives on different issues concerning medicine and Qatar. This year's inaugural theme, 'Healing Hands: Being a doctor in Qatar', promises to elicit thoughtful responses on what young people really think about medical care in Qatar.

The essay contest gives students the opportunity to explore a wide variety of possible topics including why they would want to be a doctor, what does it mean to be a doctor in Qatar, what kind of issues might affect a doctor practicing in the country and whether more are needed.

"These students are the future of Qatar, and many of them will be WCMC-Q students formally dedicated to becoming physicians. As medical educators, we know that being able to listen to and learn from your students is an integral part of the teaching process. We look forward to learning what high school students think about the issues affecting Qatar's medical profession," said Dr. Maya M. Hammoud, Senior Associate Dean for Education, WCMC-Q.

The contest's top prize will be a Doctor of the Future Summer Scholarship. WCMC-Q will send the top two winners of the competition for a fully funded two-week summer experience at Weill Cornell Medical College in New York City. Under the generous sponsorship of Dr. Ronald G. Crystal, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Genetic Medicine at WCMC-NY, the two students selected for the prize will spend time in research laboratories with prominent researchers, as well as at the renowned New York Presbyterian hospital with distinguished Weill Cornell physicians. Each winner will be allowed to bring one guardian and will also receive a \$1000.00 stipend, economy round trip airfare, and lodging in Manhattan.

Dr. Crystal commented: "I am personally very excited to receive these students here in New York. It is a great opportunity to engage young people in medicine and give them some insight into one of the world's most dynamic medical and scientific research communities".

In addition to these top prizes, the winning essays and those of the ten finalists will feature in an anthology to be published in the fall.
